



Note to Exhibitors in Sections A to P

\$25 Premier Exhibitor Awards

Premier Exhibitor is awarded to the exhibitor who accumulates the most points in applicable sections based on three points for first place, two points for second place and one point for third place. If there is a tie for most points, then the prize will go to the exhibitor with the most first places, followed by the most second places. The prize for the Premier Exhibitor Award is \$25. See individual sections to see if it applies.

1. Every exhibitor must fill out an Entry Form and bring it to the registration desk.
2. Registration for the Junior and Intermediate Division is held in Old McDonald's Barn.
3. Registration for all other sections is held on the main floor of the Exhibit Hall.
4. Exhibitors under the age of 18 do not have to pay a \$10 membership fee for exhibits entered in adult sections.
5. Next year's membership fee of \$10 is deducted from this year's prize money, unless otherwise requested.

Rules and Regulations

for Homecraft Competitors

HOW TO ENTER

- A. All exhibitors must have a MEMBERSHIP NUMBER. These can be obtained from:
Adult exhibitors: Sheila Blodgett at 613-659-2859 or Junior/Intermediate exhibitors: Monica Warren at 613-331-1709 or warrenmtw100@hotmail.com
- B. Exhibitors, 18 years of age and older, are required to pay a **\$10** membership fee.
- C. Complete the ENTRY FORM. Entries must be made in numerical order and correspond to the wording in the prize list. **Only one item can be entered in each Class** (unless otherwise stated e.g. community service project).
- D. Every entry must have an ENTRY TAG attached to it; fully completed by the exhibitor. Each tag must be legible and signed. Be sure to include '**Section**' by letter, '**Class**' by number. Record the name of the article exactly as listed in the fair book. An improperly completed entry tag could disqualify your exhibit. Homecraft exhibitor entry forms and tags are available from individuals listed above (Section A) and from the office. Entry forms are available in the fair book and on the website.
- E. Entries must be given to a committee member in the appropriate exhibit area on Wednesday from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m. or Thursday morning from 8:00 - 9:00 a.m. for adult exhibitors and 7:30 - 8:45 a.m. for Jr. & Intermediate exhibitors.

PLEASE FOLLOW THESE RULES

1. Judging of most classes will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday. All exhibit areas will be closed until judging is complete (about 3:00 p.m.).
2. Gates to the upstairs exhibit hall will be closed on Sunday at 4:00 p.m. and Old McDonald's Barn will be closed at 3:00 p.m.
3. All entries (except Culinary Arts) must remain on display until pickup time on Sunday, between 5:30 - 6:30 p.m. or Monday between 9:00 - 10:00 a.m. Exhibitors must see a committee member in charge before removing any article or exhibit. (Perishable items not awarded a prize may be removed by a committee member after judging. See committee member to do so). NOTE: Any exhibit not picked up during these hours will become the property of the Agricultural Society.
4. Prize money of less than **\$5** will not be paid.
5. Prize money will not be paid unless the article is listed on the Entry Form. Any changes or substitutions must be made through Homecraft.
6. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor whose name is on the entry form and entry tag. All articles

7. must be new work - not exhibited at the Lansdowne Fair before. Soiled crafts and clothing will not be judged.
7. In all sections of the Prize List only one award shall be made to an exhibitor in each class.
8. No exhibitor will be allowed to interfere with the judges in the performance of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their right to any premiums to which they might otherwise be entitled. Judges' decisions shall be final. No one shall be allowed in the Exhibit Hall while judging is taking place.
9. In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock or articles exhibited are of inferior quality, the judge will exercise discretion as to whether they will award first, second, or third.
10. In case of insufficient funds due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prize money awarded for exhibits.
11. Prize money for adults may not be paid for at least one month to give the Directors time to settle any disputes which may arise and sanction payment for exhibits.
12. Entry Fees of 10% will be retained from all prize money. This includes the \$25 Premier Exhibitor Awards.
13. A **\$10** Membership Fee will be withheld from all eligible **adult** exhibitors winning ten dollars (\$10) and over and shall be placed to the credit of the Society for the following year (unless otherwise requested).
14. Membership Fees allow members to vote at meetings if they are:
 - 18 years of age and older
 - a member for at least a year
 - and a member in good standing.
15. Protests must be made in writing by noon Monday following the fair. Reasons for the protest must be clearly stated and accompanied by a deposit of \$25 which shall be forfeited if the protest is not substantiated.
16. Any exhibitor or attendant, who is guilty of creating a disturbance, whether openly criticizing the judge or using obscene language to any judge or officer, shall forfeit the right to any award and may be suspended from exhibiting.

THE DIRECTORS WILL:

- Take every precaution to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Exhibition, but the owners must take the risk of exhibiting. Should any article be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power toward the recovery of same, but will not make payment for the value thereof.
- Reserve the right to interpret the rules and regulations of the Society and also has the right to amend or change these rules in any way.
- Avail themselves of the powers vested in them by the Society Act re: gambling, huckstering, soliciting funds, etc.
- Insist that the foregoing rules be strictly adhered.

- All entries to be grown by the exhibitor.
- Seed must be from either of the previous two years' growth.
- All grain and corn must be of the last two years' crop.
- All hay must be of this year's crop.
- Hay exhibits will consist of 2 four-inch slices from a bale; one for judging, one for display purposes.
- Forage and grain exhibits to be shown in plastic bags or wrapped in plastic. These can be obtained from the fair office or by contacting Chris Lappan.

A FEW TIPS FOR VEGETABLE EXHIBITORS

- ❖ Judges will be looking for clean, well-formed vegetables.
- ❖ Make sure you read the prize list carefully to see how many vegetables you should include in your entry.
- ❖ Vegetables should be fresh with no spotting or blemishes.
- ❖ Vegetables should be free from insect damage, disease or mechanical damage.
- ❖ If there is more than one vegetable in an entry, ensure that they are uniform and well matched.
- ❖ When brush cleaning root vegetables, be careful not to break the skin.

A FEW TIPS FOR FLORAL EXHIBITORS

- ❖ Read details of the class very carefully.
- ❖ Cut flowers when they are well hydrated – mornings are usually better.
- ❖ Cut flowers at the right stage of opening – not too early or too late.
- ❖ Look for uniformity.
- ❖ Place flowers immediately in water and even add preservatives (packets), if possible.
- ❖ Keep in a cool location.
- ❖ Keep leaves of cut flowers out of the water.

ROSETTE - BEST OF SHOW: for each Age Division
RULES:

- Age is as of January 1st of the current year and must be recorded on the Entry Form.
- Entries should be primarily the work of the child with minimal help from the parent or adult.
- No \$10 Membership Fee is required.
- Where age categories are listed, children are allowed to enter classes above their age division but will be disqualified if entering classes below.
- Entries must be new work – not exhibited before!
- All food must be on a disposable plate, in a sealed plastic bag.

HOW TO ENTER:

1. Fill out an Entry Form (located in this book) and bring to registration.
2. Complete an Entry Tag (as per the instructions below) for each exhibit entered.
3. Attach Entry Tag to exhibit.

AGES 3 and UNDER (as of January 1st)

CLASS

1. Make a paper bag hay bale, accessories permissible
2. Finger painting on any medium, no larger than 12" x 12"
3. Dip a pompom in paint and make a flower, 8½" x 11"







- For all quilting classes, samples of materials **MUST** be attached to the entry tag! Failure to do so may lead to disqualification.
- For quilts using a number of different fabrics, only 2 - 3 samples are required.

RULES:

- Entries must be **SOLELY MADE & QUILTED BY THE EXHIBITOR** and exhibited and judged at a local O.A.A.S. fair to be eligible for this competition.
- Both Hand Quilted Quilts and Machine Quilted Quilts must be a minimum of 280" measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
- For the Hand Quilted Quilt, the winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on the sign provided by O.A.A.S.
- For the Machine Quilted Quilt, the winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on the sign provided by O.A.A.S.
- Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual O.A.A.S. Convention.
- Upon making an entry into the O.A.A.S. Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- The winning O.A.A.S. Champion Quilts will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention O.A.A.S. competition.

NOTE: If an Exhibitor wins Grand Champion of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

O.A.A.S. Hand Quilted Quilt

"Grand Champion" and "Reserve Grand Champion" Hand Quilted Quilts, that are at least 280" measured on the perimeter, will be selected from classes 6 - 8.

O.A.A.S. Machine Quilted Quilt

"Grand Champion" and "Reserve Grand Champion" Machine Quilted Quilts, that are at least 280" measured on the perimeter, will be selected from classes 12 - 14 and 18 - 20.

The Grand Champion quilts are entitled to go to the Fall District II Annual Meeting Competition in Oct.
